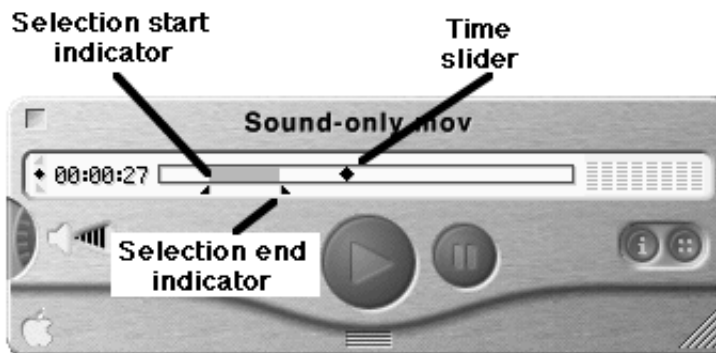


How to Edit an Audio-only QuickTime Movie

Note: You will need QuickTime Pro in order to edit a QuickTime movie.

The selection "start" and "end" indicators provide a useful visual aid in editing the sound track.



To select a segment, place the time slider at the beginning of the portion to be selected:



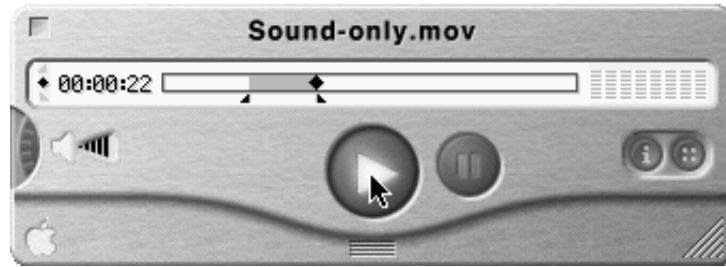
Hold down the shift key and double-click on the time slider.

The start and end indicators will jump to the point of selection.




Hold down the shift key and press the Play button to start playing.


Press the Pause button at the end of the desired selection.



To play just the selection, choose "Play Selection Only" from the Movie menu. Then press the Play button.

Or type Command  + T and press the Play button.

Note:

De-select this option or type Command  + T again to hear the whole movie.




Move the start and end indicators to adjust the selection.

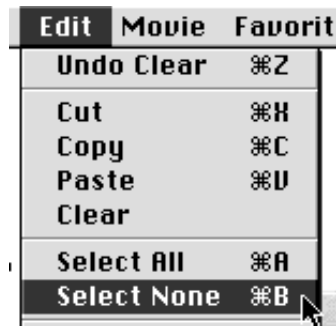


Once the desired portion is specified, you can use the Cut, Copy, Paste, and Clear commands from the Edit menu.



To de-select any selected part of the movie and set the "start" and "stop" selection indicators to the location of the diamond-shaped indicator, choose Select None from the Edit menu

or type Command  + B




Alternatively, use these key strokes:

Cut  + X Copy  + C Paste  + V

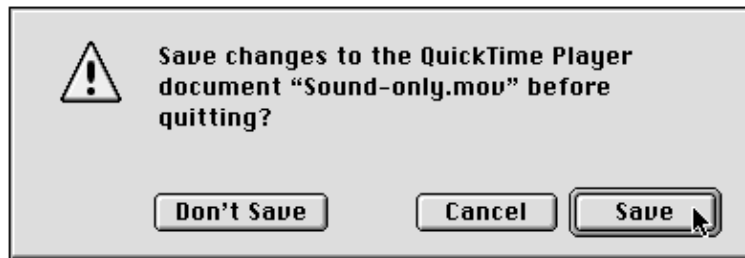
Don't forget the ever-important Undo command, which will become available after a Cut, Paste, or Copy:



Or type  + Z to Undo

Another life-saver:

After editing, when you close the file or Quit, you will see this message:



Changes in the movie will not become permanent until you click on Save.

Important note: If you choose Save as ... instead of Save, you will see this window:

You should select "Make movie self-contained."
